WEDNESDAY MAY 31st, 2017

The friendly contest **ÇA NOUS RESSEMBLE : Raconte, construis ou habite** was held on May 31 in Uashat Mak Mani-Utenam, as part of the 2017 general assembly of the Living in Northern Quebec Partnership. This competition of ephemeral artistic installations involved the students of the individualized program and the grade 5 students of Manikanetish high school in Uashat. The goal was to make young people think about the relationship they have with the territory and especially with Uashat beach, opposite the Naneu community center. The contest proposed to use given materials to build a work in teams (1" x 3 " wood, poles, spruce branches, jute rope, etc.). The contest sought to stimulate Innu youths' interest in construction and handcrafting by matching them with mentor students from the Université Laval School of Architecture. After an evaluation by a jury composed of Living in Northern Quebec partners, wich was very impressed, awards (Ipads) were given to representatives of the participating teams.

To organize the contest, exchanges took place between the director, Ghislain Caron, the Manikanetish high school staff, and the responsible students for the Université Laval School of Architecture, Simon Proulx and Pierre-Olivier Demeule. Posters containing all the details and rules of the competition have informed the professors and their students. The Uashat beach site was chosen with the agreement of Carmen Rock, assistant director for housing sector (Innu Takuaikan Uashat Mak Mani-Utenam). In case of rain, the activity could take place inside the Naneu community center just on the opposite side of the beach. Other preparatory meetings were held with the assistant director of the Manikanetish high school, Tina Vassiliou, as well as with Utshu Construction and Ébénisterie Shakashtueu who agreed to offer construction wastes.

The day before the competition, the students of the School of Architecture did a "wood chore" to collect poles and spruce branches. In terms of volume, students picked up enough materials to fill a 5 'x 8' x 5 'trailer.


On Wednesday, May 31st, the day of the competition, the mentor students had an appointment starting at 9:00 am with the youth of the Manikanetish high school. After a presentation of the theme of the competition, its schedule, the objectives and the awards involved, the students gathered in teams. With no other special instructions than to create an original, environmentally friendly installations whose assemblages would only be carried out with rope, the 18 student-participants braved rain and cold in order to build five ephemeral structures. Once on the beach, where all the materials had already been unloaded, the youngs quickly started and a first period of co-design began. The construction and assembly phase followed, in collaboration with the students of the School of Architecture to validate a concept or a technical strategy. In spite of the rain and the cold, most of the teams (4 of 5) preferred to stay outside by taking advantage of the beach sand for the construction of their structure. At the end of a working morning, five installations punctuated the coastline.

At the end of the afternoon, a jury of four Living in Northern Quebec partners went to the beach in order to evaluate the students works. It was composed of Mona Belleau, LINQ coordinator, Mary Thomassie, Saturviit, Marie Fontaine, Uashat mak Maniutenam, and Jean Tanguay, Musée de la civilization du Québec. The jury was very impressed by the inspiration and ingenuity of the young people. In a very poetic way, the installations reminded the traditional Innu shelter, while innovating with contemporary forms. The creative spirit of each team sparked numerous discussions within the jury members. Consequently, it was very difficult for them to pick a single winning team. As a result, in recognition of the excellence of all the installations, one member of each team, chosen randomly, was awarded of an iPad offered by the Living in Northern Quebec partnership. The direction of the Manikanetish high school supported this decision. At the time of the lottery, on Monday, June 5, 2017, a team had been disqualified by the direction for internal reasons. The last iPad was given into the team that got the jury's favorite.


